shall lapse seven days from the date when they were laid before Parliament unless they are approved by both Houses of Parliament before that time, (b) fines or fixed penalty notices for breach of such Regulations may only be introduced if the Regulations also provide for an appeal or administrative review mechanism to allow such fines or fixed penalty notices to be challenged, (c) when introducing such Regulations the Minister may produce guidance but that any such guidance must make clear what conduct is unlawful and what conduct is merely being advised, (d) in any such guidance the Minister must ensure consistency between the law and the guidance when explaining what conduct is unlawful, (e) all new lockdown Regulations, including amendment regulations, must be accompanied by a proportionality assessment and (f) the Prime Minister must use best endeavours to seek consistency between the national Regulations put in place in the four nations, unless very different circumstances require such measures to diverge.".
