- 3 Opposition Day: Leader of the second largest opposition party (16th allotted day (Standing Order No. 14))
 - (1) Refugees from Ukraine

Resolved, That this House once more condemns President Putin's illegal invasion of Ukraine and the war crimes being perpetrated by the Russian state there; reiterates the House's solidarity with Ukrainians in their resistance to Russia's invasion of their sovereign state; recognises that Europe is now seeing the largest movement of refugees since the Second World War, for whom the UK shares responsibility; warmly welcomes the significant and widespread offers of support for those fleeing the invasion from people and organisations across the UK; supports expansion of the family visa scheme and Homes for Ukraine scheme; and calls on the Government to go further and faster in its

response, including waiving requirements for Ukrainians to apply for visas in advance of their arrival in the UK so as to facilitate speedy access to international protection here, working with international partners to ensure vulnerable people can be resettled here and providing full and sustained funding and safeguarding to support people to rebuild their lives.—(Stuart C McDonald.)

Resolved, That this House warns that households will soon be suffering the worst income squeeze since the 1970s; notes the Institute for Fiscal Studies analysis that households are on course to be £800 worse off; calls on the Government to scrap VAT on energy bills, implement a windfall tax on companies which are benefitting from significantly increased profits as a result of impacts associated with the COVID-19

pandemic or the current international situation, and to scrap the energy bill rebate scheme and introduce immediate emergency cash payments for households.—(*Stephen Flynn*.)
