Committal

(1) The Bill shall be committed to a Committee of the whole House.

- (1) the payment out of money provided by Parliament of—
- (a) any expenditure incurred under or by virtue of the Act by the Secretary of State or any other public authority, and
- (b) any increase attributable to the Act in the sums payable under any other Act out of money so provided, and
- (2) the payment of sums into the Consolidated Fund.—(Amanda Solloway.)

Question agreed to.
