1 Speaker's Statement: The Right honourable the Baroness Boothroyd

The Speaker made the following communication to the House:

I have the sad duty to inform the House of the death of Baroness Boothroyd, Speaker of the House from 1992 to 2000. I know all Members will wish to join me in expressing our deep sadness at the loss of a ground-breaking parliamentarian, who was a dedicated and illustrious servant of this House. We send our condolences to her family and to her many friends. Not only was Betty Boothroyd an inspiring woman, but she was also an inspirational politician, and someone I was proud to call my friend.

When she was first elected as the Member for West Bromwich in 1973, there were fewer than 30 women MPs in this House. When she was elected Speaker 19 years later, women made up less than 10 per cent of the total of all MPs. To be the first woman Speaker was truly ground-breaking and Betty certainly broke that glass ceiling with panache.

She was from Yorkshire, and I am from Lancashire—so there was always that friendly rivalry between us. But from my point of view, it was heartening to hear a Northern voice speaking from the Chair. She stuck by the rules, had a no-nonsense style, but any reprimands she did issue were done with good humour and charm. Betty was one of a kind. A sharp, witty and formidable woman—and I will miss her.

I know other Members will wish to pay tribute to her and there will be an opportunity to do so tomorrow.

- (6) Standing Order No. 83B (Programming committees) shall not apply to proceedings on Consideration and Third Reading.

(7) Any other proceedings on the Bill may be programmed.—(*Mike Wood*.)
