weakening rights instead of enshrining and improving them.

Bell Ribeiro-Addy

That this House endorses the aim of saving lives and breaking the business model of people smugglers running small boat Channel crossings, as stated in paragraph 1 of the Explanatory Notes on the Illegal Migration Bill; but declines to give the Bill a Second Reading because it fails to ensure safe routes for refugees, fails to protect people from harm and exploitation by people smugglers, further expands the hostile environment for migrants which treats them as less deserving of dignity, safety and humanity and contravenes the United Kingdom's duties under the Refugee Convention 1951 and the Protocol 1967 and other fundamental and internationally recognised human rights including the right to claim asylum, the right to family life, legal rights for detained people and the prohibition of degrading inhuman treatment.
