Motion made and Question proposed, That the Offshore Petroleum Licensing Bill be now read a second time.

Amendment moved to leave out from 'That' to the end of the Question and add

'this House, while affirming the need for urgent action to tackle the UK's energy insecurity, the cost of living crisis, and the climate crisis, and for a managed, fair and prosperous transition for workers and communities, declines to give a Second Reading to the Offshore Petroleum Licensing Bill because mandating annual oil and gas licensing rounds will not reduce energy costs for households and businesses as the Secretary of State for Energy Security and Net Zero has stated, will not enhance energy security, offers no plan for the future of the UK's offshore energy communities, will ensure the UK remains at the mercy of petrostates and dictators who control fossil fuel markets, is entirely incompatible with the UK's international climate change commitments and is a totally unnecessary piece of legislation which will do nothing to serve the UK's national interest.'.—(Edward Miliband.)

Question put, That the Amendment be made.

- (4) Standing Order No. 83B (Programming committees) shall not apply to proceedings in Committee of the whole House, to any proceedings on Consideration or to proceedings on Third Reading.
