3 Multi-Storey Car Parks (Safety) Bill: Presentation (Standing Order No. 57)

Twigg and Paula Barker, presented a Bill to increase the minimum required height of guarding in multi-storey car parks; to make provision about the height of guarding in existing multi-storey car parks; to require 24 hour staffing of multi-storey car parks; and for connected purposes.

Bill read the first time; to be read a second time on Friday 4 July, and to be printed (Bill 264).

4 Registration of births (inclusion of deceased parents): Motion for leave to bring in a Bill (Standing Order No. 23)

Ordered, That leave be given to bring in a Bill to make provision for the inclusion of a parent's details on a child's birth certificate where that parent has died before the birth of the child; and for connected purposes;

That Jen Craft, Ms Stella Creasy, Caroline Voaden, Alice Macdonald, John Grady, Chris Vince, Abtisam Mohamed, Kirith Entwistle, Dr Marie Tidball, David Burton-Sampson, Daniel Francis and Charlotte Nichols present the Bill.

Jen Craft accordingly presented the Bill.

Bill read the first time; to be read a second time on Friday 11 July, and to be printed (Bill 263).
